

Clothes Aid office staff to get "boots on the ground" in Hackney

Head Office staff from Clothes Aid's Islington headquarters will spend Friday 31 July in neighbouring Hackney and Stoke Newington, distributing clothing collection bags to households in these areas.

We've given our regular distribution and collection teams in Hackney a much-needed break and the staff from our head office in Islington are brace-d and ready to ask the kind folk of Hackney, Stoke Newington and the surrounding areas to donate their forgotten frocks, leftover leggings and any other clothes which are tailor-made for recycling. The money raised from these donations will be split evenly between Macmillan Cancer Support, the NSPCC and Make-A-Wish® UK.

Bags will be distributed by Clothes Aid staff on Friday 31 July, and the team will be back after the weekend, on Tuesday 3 August to collect any donated collection bags which will hopefully be full of clothes. We ask the people of Hackney and Stoke Newington to leave any donations clearly visible from the road side, between 7am and 2pm, so that they can be collected.

It's estimated that 350,000 tonnes of clothing is thrown away in the UK every year* and Clothes Aid is doing its bit to turn old clothes into new possibilities. We think that textile recycling is a 'jean-ius' way to not only recycle unwanted items from your wardrobe, but also to support the great work of Macmillan, NSPCC and Make-A-Wish.

Paul Oakley, Operations Manager, was hopeful of lots of donations from Hackney residents. Hopefully the kind people of Hackney and Stoke Newington will declutter their wardrobes to support Macmillan Cancer Support, Make-A-Wish and the NSPCC. Everyone here has their fingers crossed for dry weather and lots of clothes to collect!"

Rather than ask only our most senior staff for their comment (as is customary), we've also asked a variety of the Clothes Aid team who will be taking part in the collections for a quote.

Dawn Taylor, Licencing Officer, previously ran the Sebright Arms on Coate Street in Hackney and knows the area well. "I'm looking forward to spending the day in Hackney with the Clothes Aid team, I know the area like the back of my hand and will hopefully see some of my old regulars."

Uzma Nuvani, HR Officer, is enthusiastic for the collection ahead. "It's going to be a new experience getting out of the office and collecting lots of clothing donations – I'm expecting it to be fun, but a lot of hard work at the same time!"
